Anti-Bullying Week

This week (15th – 19th November) is Anti-Bullying Week in schools across England and Wales. It is coordinated by the Anti-Bullying Alliance and this year's theme is One Kind Word.

"One kind word leads to another. Kindness fuels kindness. So from the playground to Parliament, and from our phones to our homes, together, our actions can fire a chain reaction that powers positivity. It starts with one kind word. It starts this Anti-Bullying Week."

Bullying is defined as the repetitive, intentional hurting of one person or group by another where the relationship involves an imbalance of power. Pupils and parents should be assured that at Marsh Hill we take bullying seriously. The school fosters high expectations and we will challenge any behaviour that falls below this.

This afternoon, we held our annual election of our Anti-Bullying Ambassadors. Their role is to help educate their peers on bullying, lead on anti-bullying campaigns, promote a culture which celebrates and tolerates difference and help keep their peers safe both online and offline. Those pupils who are successful will be announced in assembly on Monday 22nd November. I would like to thank Cathy Lomas for organising this process and for supporting the elected pupils over the course of this academic year.

Nasal Flu Spray

This week you will have received a letter regarding the Nasal Flu Spray which will offer your child protection against winter flu. The School Nurse Team will be in school on **Monday 13th December** to give children the spray which is put up each nostril and is quick and painless.

Flu can be a very unpleasant in children causing fever, stuffy nose, dry cough, sore throat, aching muscles and joints and extreme tiredness. Having the nasal flu spray also help to reduce the risk to others in your family who may be at greater risk from flu, such as grandparents or those with long term health conditions.
