Christmas Jumper – Save the Children



<u>Year 3 – Volcanos</u>

I have been very impressed by the art work that I have seen created by Year 3 children this week. They have made volcanos out of modelling clay that are very impressive. They made volcanos because it links to their Geography topic. Not only are they brilliant artists but they are very well informed:

Oskar: "Volcanos can be active, dormant or extinct."

Tilly: "Active volcanos have recently erupted and probably will again. Dormant volcanos have not erupted for a very long time but probably will again; and extinct volcanos erupted thousands of years ago and probably won't erupt again."



<u>Year 4 – The Rain Forest</u>

I have also been impressed with Year 4's project work on the Rainforest. They too have very good retrieval knowledge, as Safa's and Vivan's recall of what they have learnt demonstrates.

Safaa: "The rainforest has four different layers. They are the forest floor, the understory, the canopy layer, where a lot of animals like monkeys and snakes live, and the emergent layer."

Vivan: "The forest floor is in complete darkness and animals live in the buttress roots of the trees. Sloth, frog and toucans live in the canopy layer. Some animals live in the canopy layer and hunt in the understory layer for their prey and need to eat. The emergent layer is the highest layer and all the trees stick out from the roof which is in the canopy layer."





Please take some time over the weekend to ask your children what they have been learning about in school over the course of this term. You may be surprised by how much they know about a whole variety of subject areas.
